MAUNDY THURSDAY The Hand of the Lord Who Serves and Feeds Us April 17, 2025



AS WE GATHER...When Christians gather as the church, it is for what we normally call a "service." In daily life a "service" is, of course, a person or group who provides something of value to others; for instance, a food service, a cleaning service, or a place for "servicing" your car. But when we gather as church for a service, who is doing the serving and who is being served? After all, with our eyes we only see one another singing and praying, making the sign of the cross, standing, sitting, kneeling, baptizing with water, and communing with bread and wine. It is easy for some to get the impression that this activity we call "worship" is a gathering where we are doing something for God. What is really going on of most importance is God's doing, God's serving us through the ministry of Word and Sacrament. This divine service was most dramatically shown in this night on which our Lord Jesus serves and feeds us.

Tonight, our mighty Lord, who has proved His power over demons, sickness, and even death, takes the humbler part. His loving service is shown, first, by taking the role of a servant washing His disciples' feet. His greatest and chief service, however, He announced as He took charge of the ancient Passover meal, changing it from a mere memorial of what God has done in the Old Testament exodus of the past to its fulfillment in what He was about to accomplish in His innocent, bitter suffering and death on a cross. From now on, the fulfillment of the annual Passover feast is to be celebrated "often" as the chief means by which God literally connects us with our Lord's crucified body and His precious blood that take away the sin of the world "as often as we eat this bread and drink this cup" (LSB, p. 162).

COMMUNION STATEMENT

As you prepare to receive the Lord's Body and Blood, please review these questions:

- 1. Am I sorry for my sins and do I repent of them?
- 2. Do I believe in Jesus as my Savior and that His body and blood are truly present together with the bread and the wine?
- 3. Do I want to live as a forgiven Christian, in love to God & neighbor, with the help of the Holy Spirit?
- 4. Am I a member of an LCMS congregation or a congregation in fellowship with the LCMS?

If you are not in agreement with these questions, please refrain from communing or speak with a pastor before communing.

During this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that prevents us from trusting in God and loving one another. By God's Word, during these forty days we have been reminded that the true repentance, faith, and love required of us is, and can only be, the product of God's own action on our behalf. In Jesus we have seen the very hand of God working to save us by serving us. He is the Hand of the Lord who freely gives Himself in love for us, the Hand of the Lord who created us, and the Hand of the Lord who casts out demons, who heals the sick, who raises the dead, and who holds all things together as the mighty Savior, who reigns over all. This night we gather at the Lord's invitation to complete our Lenten discipline by examining ourselves, receiving Holy Absolution of all our sins, and by means of the Sacrament of the Altar, being made actual participants in the body and blood of Christ, the precious price of our salvation. Whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup, confidently believing the Word and promise of Christ, dwells in Christ and Christ in him and has eternal life. We should also do this in remembrance of Him, showing His death. Giving Him our most heartfelt thanks, we take up our cross and follow Him and, according to His commandment, love one another as He has loved us. As our Lord on this night exemplified this love by washing His disciples' feet, so we by our words and actions serve one another in love. May the almighty and merciful God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, by His Holy Spirit, accomplish this in us.

People: Amen.

Silence for reflection on God's Word and for self-examination.

Pastor: O almighty God, merciful Father,

People: I, a poor, miserable sinner, confess unto You all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended You and justly deserved Your temporal and eternal punishment. But I am heartily sorry for them and sincerely repent of them, and I pray You of Your boundless mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to be gracious and merciful to me, a poor, sinful being.

Pastor: God be merciful to you and strengthen your faith.

Pastor: Do you believe that the forgiveness I speak is not my forgiveness but God's?

People: Yes.

Pastor: Let it be done for you as you believe. In the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ I

forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the † Son and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

On Maundy (Holy) Thursday, the service concludes with the removing all ornaments, linens, and paraments. This is an ancient custom symbolic of the humiliation of Jesus at the hands of the soldiers. After the Last Supper, less than twenty-four hours remained in the earthly life of our Lord. Events moved rapidly: prayer in Gethsemane, betrayal by Judas, arrest, mock trial, beating, crowning with thorns, spitting, mockery, the trudge to Golgotha and shameful death. As His life was stripped from Him, so we strip our altar of the signs that symbolize His purposeful, redemptive suffering and death "for us and for our Salvation." Psalm 22 is chanted as the various elements from the chancel are removed.

The service concludes without a Benediction to indicate that these three days—Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Saturday—are a united time of devotional meditation.

All leave the church in silence.
