



BEHAVIOR SYSTEM®

Our classroom will use a clip chart to monitor behavior. A clip chart is a great tool that allows students to be rewarded for positive behavior,

while discouraging negative behavior.

Each student has a clothespin, or clip, with his or her name on it.

Everyone will start on green at the beginning of each day, and clips can

be moved up and down throughout the day based on behavior.

Students will earn "Caught You" tickets to be entered into a drawing based on the level they end the day with! {Ticket scale: green = 1; blue = 2; purple = 3; pink = 4}

The Flying High level is reserved for outstanding behavior.

Students can move to the Outstanding Effort level for continuing to display good behavior. You should be very proud of your child for reaching this level!

Students will move to the Taking Flight level for showing that they are

making the right behavior decisions! Ending the day on this level is great!

Every student will start the day on the In the Nest level.

As the day goes on, clips can be moved up and down, based on behavior. This level is a good one to be on!

A student will be moved to the Head in the Clouds level as a warning about

his/her behavior, and a reminder to follow the rules.

Students who continue to display poor behavior can move down to the

Teacher's Choice level. Here, the teacher can decide what action to

take. An in-classroom time out and/or loss of some recess time (on the wall) might be an appropriate choice.

If a student moves to Stop and Think, the student will have an in-classroom timeout, will fill out a Stop and Think sheet, and

discuss the behavior with the teacher. Some recess time on the wall might be an appropriate choice by the teacher.

When a student moves to the Parent Contact level, the teacher will

notify parents via email or phone call. A visit to the Principal's office might

also be in order. Students on this level may also lose recess time, etc. and a red card note may need to be signed.

Reading Workshop

Components of Reading Workshop


Mini Lesson: A whole group lesson that follows a prescribed curriculum and targets one skill or standard appropriate for the grade level. The teacher models and provides examples with read aloud or shared text.

Independent Reading: Students practice skills with selfselected "just right" text. This is an opportunity for building stamina, reading with focus and engagement, and skill building. During this time, students may read alone and/or with a partner. The child will write in response to their reading and conference with the reader.

Small Group Instruction: (Strategy Groups) The teacher will pull a small group of students to work at their instructional level to guide their reading and teach skills needed to advance to the next reading level and deepen comprehension.

Share: Students have opportunity to share and discuss their reading with other students to deepen comprehension and apply what has been learned. Teachers will also share to emphasize skills and strategies that proficient readers use.





What is Readers Workshop?

Reading Workshop is a powerful way to structure reading class. It engages students in the process of becoming fluent readers and <u>thinkers</u>. Readers Workshop enables us to teach important lesson, skills and strategies in all areas of reading – from book choice to building reading stamina to decoding skills to comprehension. Most importantly, it provides students with time to read and guidance from the teacher while reading books of their choice.

Teaching children how to read, understand what they read, and find joy in the process of reading is a complex task. Your children need time to practice and develop these skills.

Why Workshop?

- · Teachers using real literature to teach reading.
- Teaches students at individual levels to allow for differentiation of instruction.
- Teachers model the work of real readers then prepare the students for transfer of learning to other books and topics.

Words To Know:

Comprehension: Understanding what is read.

Fluency: Ability to read with accuracy and good pacing.

Stamina: The ability to slowly increase the amount of time spent reading with focus and engagement.

Just Right Book: A book at an independent level that a child can read with understanding for practice of skills being taught.

Instructional Level: The text read with teacher guidance to assist the reader in advancing levels with direct teaching for skills and concepts.


<u>Reading Log:</u> A place to record book titles, pages read and time spent reading. Used to monitor and understand your child as a reader.

How to Help Your Child At Home

- Talk about books as a family
- Read with your child every day
- Ask your child to share with you what he or she is reading. Ask- What is the best part? Does the character remind you of anyone you know? Do you like this author's style, why?
- Make reading a priority. Young readers should reread old favorites, read the pictures and tell stories and nursery rhymes with you.
- Older readers can benefit from reading a series or many books by the same author. You can read the same book and discuss it with your child.
- Trust your child's teacher to match the reader with the right text for learning – the book is essential!

SANDAR CHARGE Character Christian Character Throughout the year we will be talking about seven key virtues that we as

Christians live by. These virtues are presented through Biblical narratives where we will experience the story through the shoes of the character, reflect on their actions as well as internalize how we might have reacted. Finally, we will learn how we are called to act, being motivated by the Holy Spirit to serve for a Greater Purpose.

 \star The Seven Virtues:

Justice, Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Courage, Diligence, Self-Sacrifice

Who's Involved? All of our grades will be working with their teachers through the Christian Character Formation Project. Families will also be encouraged to participate through a weekly devotion that will be emailed home. These devotions will be connected to that week's classroom curriculum. A school wide weekly Bible verse will be focused on and used as memory in some of our classrooms. We encourage families, as part of their devotion time, to study the Bible verse as well.



- Memory Work list is on teacher website
- ★ Memory Work may be individually recited any day of the week. Late scores will be given after the week's end.
- ★ Only the verse needs to be memorized. The Bible reference does not.
- ★ Memory Work starts the last week of August.





The following rules are in effect: 1. All clothing and **footwear** should be neat, clean, the appropriate size, and worn appropriately. 2. Students may not wear clothing that bears the pictures or names of secular music groups, reference to drugs (including alcohol or tobacco), or any pictures or writing that may be construed to be in poor taste or in any way disruptive to the learning process at our school. 3. The following items of clothing are inappropriate in the classroom and may not be worn: immodest clothing (such as halter tops, tank tops, visible underwear) bare midriff clothing, too tight clothing, frayed or torn clothing, or military/hunting clothing. Students in grades 3-8 may not wear sweatpants or warm-ups. 4. The guiding principle in determining appropriate footwear is health and safety. Therefore, ill-fitting or loosely fitting shoes are inappropriate. For safety reasons, including stairs that need to be climbed each day, we must insist upon shoes that fit so as to prevent tripping, flopping, or unnecessary noise while walking or climbing stairs. Acceptable footwear include loafers, boots, deck shoes, heel strapped sandals, traditional dress shoes, or athletic footwear that are well maintained, clean and properly laced. 17 5. On **chapel days** or special occasions, a higher standard of dress is required. This is a way of reflecting our respect for our God and the importance we place on worship. Boys are expected to wear collared shirts or sweaters and dress pants. Girls are expected to wear dress tops and appropriate skirts or dress pants. During the months of August, September, October, May and June students may wear dress shorts. On chapel days, the following attire is **not** appropriate: • denim (any color) • T-shirts • Sweatshirts • uniform/athletic clothing 6. Students may wear shorts during the months of August, September, October, May and June or at discretion of the Principal. Shorts must be mid-thigh length or longer. Spandex, cutoffs (jeans or sweatpants), torn shorts, tight or short shorts, gym or jogging shorts are not permitted. 7. Visible body piercings and visible tattoos are not allowed. Girls may wear modest earrings. Hair must be a natural color and may not be styled in an extreme fashion. Excessive make-up may not be worn.


What is a B.I.R.D. book? Being Independent & Ready Daily

Every afternoon a take-home folder (B.I.R.D. book) will come home. Please look through the folder EACH NIGHT and send the folder back to school with the finished homework and signed notes when applicable. Please be sure to always keep your Reading Log in your folder as well.

School	
Money and Notes Pouch	This pouch will house notes "for the teacher" and notes "for the parents" - it is also an ideal place to put money for tuition, lunch, milk, and field trips.
Folder Pockets	School notes, permission slips, homework, and other important sheets will be placed in the 2 pocket folders. The hands located on the folder's pockets indicate if the paperwork is to be filled out and brought RIGHT Back to School or LEFT at Home .
Class List Label	A class list label is attached to the BIRD Book for you to reference when needed.
Schedule	Our class schedule will be attached to the BIRD Book for you to reference when needed. Our subjects, specials, lunch, and recess time are indicated on the schedule.
Handwriting and Sight Words & Fluency Phrases Books	Your child will learn many high frequency words in 1st Grade. Our handwriting chart is also included so you can see the proper way your child is expected to write letters.
Spelling Lists	Spelling words will be included in your child's BIRD book.
Reading Road Race Rally Book Log	Please fill out the reading log weekly and keep in folder.

HOMEWORK -

GRADES K-4 HOMEWORK POLICY In an effort to teach diligence and responsibility, St. Paul Lutheran School requires children to complete homework on time and to the best of their God-given ability. Parents are to play an active role in encouraging their child to maximize their blessings and turn in their work on time. Late work will result in a 10% grade reduction. (First grade will start grade reduction third trimester.) When students fall behind in their work, they will need to spend time after school. Those students that have outstanding work as of 3:15 pm on Tuesday from that week or previous weeks will be required to attend a 30 minute after school detention on Thursday. This policy will start at the beginning of the year for grades 1-4. Kindergarten will begin this policy third trimester.
